10:00 -11:15 AM	PANEL 2: Pipeline Safety The Department of Transportation's Pipeline Hazardous Materials and Safety Administration (PHMSA) has been working for a number of years on two proposed rulemakings addressing safety of hazardous liquids pipelines and safety of gas transmission/gathering lines. Both proposals would expand PHMSA's jurisdiction over gathering lines and subject gathering lines to a number of rulemakings that were proposed prior to PHMSA proposing to expand jurisdiction to natural gas gathering lines (e.g., plastic piping, operator qualifications). PHMSA issued the hazardous liquids rule on January 23, 2017, although it is unclear when the rule can take effect, in light of the Trump Administration memo to delay new rules for 60 days to allow review by the new Administration. The gas transmission and gathering rule has undergone comments and is under consideration, with a projected publication date of December 2017. However, further delay is likely. This panel will look at PHMSA's agenda and its implications for independent producers. 1:00 - 2:15 PM	PANEL 4: Habitat Conservation Plans Habitat Conservation Plans (HCPs) are an evolving tool that companies can use to carry out their activities in compliance with the Endangered Species Act. As the ESA has become increasingly difficult to navigate in recent years, companies from a range of industries including oil and gas have looked to HCPs to streamline project development and gain long-term regulatory certainty in return for minimizing and mitigating potential adverse impacts to listed species. This panel, consisting of individuals working on a multistate HCP that is currently in development for members of the oil and gas industry, will walk through the issues associated with preparing HCPs, including industry considerations, legal concerns, NEPA compliance, and collaborating with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.
